After a record 84 days in orbit, the crew of Skylab 4 returns to Earth on February 8th.


The five month oil embargo by most OPEC nations against the United States, Europe and Japan, which caused the 1973 oil crisis, ended on March 18th.

Carrie, the debut novel by Stephen King, was published on April 5th.



Clyde C. Wilhoite, Class of '53

Clyde Courtney Wilhoite, 88, passed away Sunday, Feb. 11, 2024, at the Flo

and Phil Jones Hospice House. He was born June 22, 1935, in Columbia, Tenn., to the late Clyde and Josephine Anderson Wilhoite. Clyde attended CMA for six years, graduating with the Class of 1953. His further education was at Vander- Clyde Wilhoite



bilt University, Denver University, Delta State University and Memphis State University (now University of Memphis). He served eight years in the United States Air Force with additional education including the Air University, Basic Instructor Training and the Extension Course Institute. He had been a member of the First United Methodist Church in Jonesboro since 1977, serving there as chairman of the education committee, member of the administrative board, member of the finance committee and as a greeter at the chapel service. He worked in personnel, human resources and hospital administration for 43 years. His hobbies included photography and umpiring baseball and softball for 36 years. He umpired baseball from youth, college and semi-pro. He had a membership in the National Association of Umpires and Babe Ruth League and also served as an assistant state commissioner for the Babe Ruth League. His umpiring began in Denver, Colo., in 1958. He umpired in the American Legion District tournaments and Babe Ruth League district, state and regional tournaments. Clyde is an inductee into the Jonesboro Baseball Boosters Wall of Honor. His memberships included the Kiwanis Club of Jonesboro where he served as president and division lieutenant governor; the Society for Human Resource Management, achieving certification as a professional in human resources; and the Arkansas Healthcare Human Resources Association where he served as president. He had been a member of St. Bernard's Auxiliary since 1999, serving as the Auxiliary's first male president and for three years as treasurer. He served for a number of years on the CMA Alumni Association Board of Directors. He was preceded in death by his wife, Alice Maddux Wilhoite, a brother, Marion Wilhoite, and a sister-in -law, Brooks Fiscus. He is survived by

his children, Martha Wilhoite and Van Wilhoite; sister, Susan Wilhoite Hunter; brother, Andy Wilhoite (Debbie); sisterin-law, Dorothy Wilhoite; two grandchildren; and several nieces and neph-

Lawrence W. Zimmer Jr., Class of '53

Larry Zimmer, 88, known as the "Voice of the Buffaloes" for 42 seasons with

the University of Colorado football and basketball programs, passed away peacefully on January 20, 2024, surrounded by his family. Born Nov. 13, 1935 in New Orleans, Louisiana, Larry attended CMA for two years,

graduating with the Class of 1953. He then attended Louisiana State University before transferring to the University of Missouri, where he graduated with a bachelor's degree in journalism in 1957. He then served two years on active duty in the United States Army, earning the rank of 1st Lieutenant and was awarded the Army Commendation Medal. In the summer of 1966, he relocated to Michigan and began broadcasting for the Wolverine basketball and teams. In 1971, he was hired by KOA sports to do the play-by-play for CU football and the color commentary for the Denver Broncos. He would spend the next 19 seasons doing the analysis for Bronco games, and then took over for the next seven as play-by-play man. One of the major highlights of his broadcasting career took place in 1980, as he joined the CBS crew that broadcast the 1980 Olympic Games in Lake Placid. He became best known as the "Voice of the Buffaloes," calling every game between 1971 and 1981. In 1982, CU strayed away from KOA but the Buffs returned to KOA in 1985 and Zimmer was back "home" after spending three years handling the play-byplay chores for Colorado State. After retiring as KOA's sports director in 2004, he shifted into the analyst role on football broadcasts. Larry was involved in either play-by-play or commentary duties for 50 college football seasons, 42 for CU, and 26 seasons with the Denver Broncos among his many other assignments throughout a seven-decade broadcasting career dating back to his

college days at the University of Missouri. He started out as an analyst on Bronco games in 1971 and took over the play-by-play duties for Super Bowl XXIV in 1990 through the '96 season, working a total of 122 preseason, 394 regular season and 20 postseason games for a total of 536 games combined, including four Super Bowls. In 1992, he was awarded the Honorary C" for his contribution to Colorado Athletics, and in 2005, he was the recipient of the Forever Buff Award from the Alumni C Club. He was inducted into the Broadcast Pioneers of Colorado Hall of Fame in 2009, the Colorado Sports Hall of Fame in 2010, the CU Athletic Hall of Fame in 2012 and the Colorado Snowsports Museum Hall of Fame in 2013. He was also a five-time winner of both the White Stagg Award for Excellence in Ski Journalism and the Colorado Sportscaster of the Year Award; he was the Colorado Broadcaster of the Year in 1996. In 2009, he was the recipient of the 14th annual prestigious Chris Schenkel Award, named in honor the long-time play-by-play man for ABC Sports; it recognizes a sports broadcaster who enjoyed a long and distinguished career broadcasting college football at a single institution. To date, only 28 announcers have been presented with the award. Larry is survived by his wife of 51 years, the former Brigitte Bastian; son Lawrence III (Linda); daughter Tracey Robb (J.C.); and a granddaughter, Shannon Robb.

Onnie Rex Coker, Class of '66

Onnie Rex Coker, 75, became totally healed and had a sweet reunion in

Heaven with his family on February 5, 2024. He was born on August 10, 1948, in Amory, Mississippi to the late Woodie LaOnnie Coker and Margaret Patterson Coker. Rex grew up in Monroe County and attended CMA for two years, graduating with

Rex was supportive of the grandkids and loved them dearly. Despite the loss of his children over the past ten years, his faith in God had only strengthened. A longtime member of Meadowood Baptist Church, he loved his Sunday school class members and his church family.
