


# The COLUMBIA MILITARY ACADEMY



## For Seventy Years ... An Educational Tradition

The 67 acres of land where Columbia Military Academy is now sited was at one time a part of Polk plantation. Before the academy was started, an armory was here. This armory was founded by a Nashvillian named Colonel T.T. Wright whose idea for a national arsenal at Columbia was accepted on the 10th of May, 1888 when the president of the United States signed his approval. The citizens of Maury County bought the land and ceded it to the

federal government for the site of the arsenal.

Frank Gordon was contracted to build the armory. Four buildings were to be of stone. This stone was bought from Lynneville, Hurricane Switch, and Bowling Green quarries. There were five more buildings constructed of brick bought locally in Columbia. All of the original buildings are still standing. These buildings were first used by the government for a harness factory during the 1890's. Later, under the McKinley administration, they were used to quarter the American soldiers who were in training for the Spanish-American war. In 1904 the property and its buildings were declared surplus property and recommended for conversion to a military academy. The property was conveyed by deed of trust to a board of trustees and their successors forever, so long as the property was operated as an educational institution and complied with the military curriculum approved by the Secretary of Defense. For seventy years, C.M.A. has met these requirements.


## Keeping High Academic Standards

# THE ADMINISTRATION EXEMPLIES LEADERSHIP





School nurse, Mrs. Gwen Lollar, and assistant commandant, Bill Harris, often confer with Major Fly about their day's routine.








## UNIQUE CURRICULUM

The general definition given when one might ask "what's a Nova?" probably would have something to do with stars or star systems. But not at CMA. To the CMA cadets, a Nova has been a unique and sometimes mystifying experience in education. An innovative program, the Nova system provides seven twenty-four day grading periods per school year. Each grading period is called a Nova. During each Nova, the student studies comprehensively the subjects he has chosen for that period. The next Nova, he will study something totally different, under different teachers, with different classmates. One thing the Nova system offers is plenty of variety.


Mr. Hann (and other faculty members as well) sometimes has a little difficulty explaining to students that it is possible to study the whole Civil War in twentyfour days.


#### MR. FLY

#### MR. BAKER



#### Ms. Marks


Miss Marks received her B.A. from DePaul University. This year, in addition to teaching Latin, she prepared JCL members for state competition where they did very well.




### Mr. Murphy

Mr. Rose received his B.S. from Sewanee and his M.A. from Peabody. He teaches English, and assists in arrangements for social functions.








#### Mrs. Stephenson

#### Mr. Shields






#### Mr. Matta


Mrs. Taylor received her B.A. from the University of Tennessee. This year she has sponsored the cheerleaders and taught phys. ed. classes to all 12 grades.

#### MILITARY SCIENCE DEPARTMENT






